## **SECTION 4: First aid measures**

## 4.1 Description of first aid measures

**Eye contact**

Inhalation

Skin contact

If material has been swallowed and the exposed person is conscious, give small quantities of water to drink. Stop if the exposed person feels sick as vomiting may be dangerous. Do not induce vomiting unless directed to do so by medical personnel. If vomiting occurs, the head should be kept low so that vomit does not enter the lungs. Get medical attention if adverse health effects persist or are severe. Never give anything by mouth to an unconscious person. # 6.2 Environmental precautions

#### 6.3 Methods and materials for containment and cleaning up

### **Small spill**

Alternatively, or if water-insoluble, absorb with an inert dry material and place in an appropriate waste disposal container. Dispose of via a licensed waste disposal contractor.

#### 7.1 Precautions for safe handling

#### **Protective measures**
